2. Preventative services

Our family support worker has worked with 14 of our pupil premium families. She supported the families through parent workshops on parenting skills, weekly drop-in / coffee morning, 1:1 support for behaviour issues, home visits and support during the school holidays.

Our welfare and attendance officer worked with 19 of our pupil premium families. She supported them through setting up parenting contracts, putting families in touch with charities and support services and liaising with other

professionals both within school and externally. Pupil Premium attendance at the end of the year was 94.2% compared to 95.4% for the whole school.

Our educational psychologist worked with 9 pupil premium families during 2015-16 giving each family a day for assessment and follow up meetings. Strategies within the educational psychology report support staff in meeting the needs of these pupils.

3. THRIVE Intervention

20 Pupil Premium children were supported through the THRIVE intervention. This involves 1:1 intervention weekly. The children were assessed at the beginning of the year and at regular intervals. 17 of the children (85%) made progress on the THRIVE assessments.

Pupil Premium funding has also been used to purchase a play bus which will be used as a dedicated THRIVE space from September 2016.

4. Enrichment Activities

Pupil premium funding enabled all pupils who wished to do so, to take part in all school trips including the residential in Year 6. We were also able to provide music lessons for those children who wished to learn a musical instrument. During 2015-16 we also used Pupil Premium funding to establish a Forest School which offers children opportunities to develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a natural environment.
