He puts the blue sweet second.


The red sweet is between the purple

THRIVE Bus







Last week we took delivery of a large purple bus! It is in need of a makeover but we have some very talented staff who will make an amazing space for the children. THRIVE is a specialist provision to support children with personal, social and emotional well-being. This is based on the latest research in brain and child development which has shown that an interruption to, or lack of experience in, early emotional development is often expressed by children as challenging or unhealthy behaviour, which can have a negative impact on their ability to learn and thrive. Fortunately, research shows that it is nearly always possible to do reparative work. The key to success is in the relationship between adults and children.

As our school numbers have grown we find ourselves squeezed for space for a dedicated "THRIVE" room so we plan to convert the bus into a special place for 'thrive' children. It will have several functions: regular or occasional 1:1 work; a place of refuge when children are very upset by circumstances beyond their control, such as a bereavement in the family; a playroom for named children at unstructured times, etc.

We will be making calming and comforting areas within the bus so if you have any Christmas lights you no longer need or fabrics, voiles or cushions that you could donate we would be very appreciative. The bus will also have areas for art and craft activities and messy play.

If anyone has spare sleepers they would like to donate we would be very grateful as we will have to prop the bus up on these as we are not planning on driving it anywhere in the near future!

And finally a little pleas from the Breakfast Club. If you can bring the correct money (but not lots of small change!) it helps speed up the signing in process in the morning. You can always pay for more than one day at a time if you wish. Thank you.
