This week we have been thinking about our mental health. Thank you to Mrs Wall who launched this on Monday morning's assembly. You can see throughout this newsletter how we are thinking about some of the five-a-day: connect with others, volunteer / help others, keep learning, stay active and keep fit. This half term, teachers and teaching assistants have been working on our policy for Teaching, Learning and Assessment to clearly capture the best practice and experience for children in the classroom that we all adhere to. An important feature of this is the link with home. Working in partnership with home and school has the biggest impact. The expectations for homework were sent out in the start of term's curriculum information letter which you can find on the website. Listening to your child read and sharing a good book with them at home is the best thing you can do to help your child be successful in their wider learning and later life. This week our teachers in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 took part in two days of training for a new phonics teaching programme (*Read, Write Inc*) that we started this year. Parents in these years will be invited in to find out more in the near future and you will start to see books coming home from this scheme. We will also be involving some children from older years. This scheme is to make sure we teach in a consistent way across the school and ensure continued high standards in reading.

### Local History Project Competition - 27.11.19

While your children will be working on their reading, spellings and times tables at home, we would also like to offer a voluntary homework project to those who are interested. This is to help inspire a love and interest in learning, just for the sake of learning. It is open to all children of all ages. Each term there will be a different theme. This term the theme is *Local History*. Children can choose any medium to produce any type of project e.g. through art work, models, poems, stories, interactive, IT, craft, webpage, facts and figures. Anything goes. Final projects will be judged for child-input, effort and creativity. There will be prizes for the winners and a special 'tea-party' for all the children who take part. We are using this opportunity to help make links with the older generation. We will be joined by residents from Dunboyne Court, the local retirement home, who will be the judges and hold the 'tea-party'. Making connections, doing things for others and an enjoyment of learning are three important aspects to keeping our brain's healthy. Completed projects should be brought into school on the morning of Wednesday 27th November (not before please). After school on this day, you will have a chance to have a look at the entries and see the winners on display in the Woodland Den.

### Harvest Festival 14.10.19

On Monday we are having our Harvest festival assembly led by the Reverend Nathan from Cuthbert Mayne. We are collecting donations for *Humanity Torbay* which is based in Union Street. They expect this number to increase to over 70 in the winter months. Volunteers from Humanity Torbay will join us for our assembly on Monday. They would welcome any donations of long-life food (tins, packets, cereal, sugar, sauces, biscuits etc.) toiletries (shampoo, toilet roll etc.) and other house-hold items (nappies, bedding, clothing in a good condition). We would be very grateful if you could bring any of these donations to school on Monday morning.

### Parking


