Breakfast and After School Club

We sympathise with how frustrating it is for parents trying to balance their working and childcare commitments during this difficult time. Because of this, we are continuing with the Breakfast Club and After School Club provision at this time, but unfortunately have had to reduce the hours of provision. The Breakfast Club will be available from 8.00 a.m.-8.45 a.m. daily and After School Club will finish at 5.00 p.m. The reason for the reduction in provision is that these clubs are self-funded and although numbers have reduced at the

moment the level of staffing has increased. This is because we have to have separate staffing for Foundation/KS1 children and staffing for KS2 children. This reduction in hours will enable us to manage our staffing costs more effectively and hopefully keep the clubs open in the future.

Breakfast Club and Afterschool Club will have their own telephone number from Monday 9th November which is 07783607282 if you need to speak to them. Please note that you will not be able to contact these clubs out of normal school hours. The main office is manned between 8.15 a.m. until 4.15 p.m. for phone calls. We are sorry for the inconvenience and will continually monitor and revise the situation.

Moving into the New Lockdown

In a briefing with Public Health and Torbay this week, I was told that this new lockdown is coming at a good time for Torbay as rates of infection have risen steadily in September and October. The good news is this lockdown is anticipated to slow infection rates and then reduce them towards the end of the month, and that any new infections will be better contained because of the lockdown.

As rates have risen, the likelihood of symptoms being positive has increased. Therefore from now onwards anybody with symptoms (pupils or staff) who share a house with a confirmed case will be assumed to be positive. This is not government policy; it is a local decision taken by Torbay from Tuesday this week. This increases the likelihood of us having a partial lockdown in school but will help prevent onward spread. It is really important that we know from now on when any children first display symptoms. Please inform us if your child gets symptoms when they are in the middle of isolating if there is a positive case in your house.

Any measures we can take will always help. To this end please consider carefully who drops off and collects your children during lockdown. It will certainly help if you can ensure it is only family members, preferably those who live at home, and that you don't collect and drop off children from other families if at all possible.

One of the big messages Public Health want to get out there is about the behaviour of young people during lockdown. It appears that adolescents and young people up to the age of 29 are the main cause for the increase in infections. Please do whatever you can to ensure they follow the rules and social distance. Keeping classrooms as ventilated as possible is something teachers are currently trying to do as there's evidence that the virus doesn't linger in such conditions. While we will obviously be balancing this as best as possible with keeping everybody warm in the winter months, please do send your child in everyday with warm clothing, jumper and coat.

Key message: don't get Covid fatigue – now is the time to double down.

Road Traffic Accident Appeal


